

Getting Started: Course Selection Process

Course selection timeline:

- X Course selection lesson for current 8th graders: TODAY, Wed, Feb 7th
- Course Information Fair Tues, Feb 6th
- Counselors will be in English classes Feb 13-19 to meet with small groups of students
- **X** Students can have a 1:1 meetings with a counselor (Feb 20-22 during lunches)
- **X** Students utilize the grade level worksheet and should be prepared to review during meetings. Students would discuss choices with their current teachers as well.

Course Changes/Adjustments:

- Can be made during the last week of school (in June)
- Times will be available in mid-August & the first 5 days of the semester



Parental Support / Involvement

- **X** Review Course Request Form (which your 8th graders received today) and discuss course options
- ✗ Discuss extracurricular activities and evaluate impact on academic course load
- ✗ Discuss post-secondary goals and which courses will be best to support those goals (in case you missed it- <u>Career Exploration</u> <u>presentation</u>)
- **✗** Ensure student has met with a counselor and entered course requests by Friday, Feb 22nd.



Course Levels

<u>College Prep (CP)</u> - Courses with academic rigor preparing students for post-secondary education (4-year universities and 2-year colleges).

<u>Honors Course</u> – A course with extensive, independent work outside of the classroom for students who wish to challenge themselves beyond the general curriculum.

<u>AP (Advanced Placement)</u> - Courses designed to challenge highly motivated students who have demonstrated exceptional academic ability and who wish to study at the collegiate level while still in high school. Students will take an AP exams in May. A qualifying score could earn a student up to 8 college credits.






Balance in course selection

- Current teachers are great resources for advising course selection!
- Check in with during ADVISORY time
- Take stock of your strengths and challenges and how those match up with course selection. For example, if math is challenging, consider taking math courses that progress at a slower pace.
- What are your academic interests? Make selections that are right for **YOU**. Life is a journey of discovery. You are more productive when you enjoy what you are doing!



Balance Academic Rigor

- Choose Honors and/or AP classes in areas of interest or areas you want to explore further.
- Honors courses require a larger time commitment and independent learning.
- Don't let academic commitments interfere with your health and well-being. Is your course load too rigorous to allow time for other things?




STUDENT SUPPORT RESOURCES:

Study Labs & Homework Club

Study labs - provide time within the school day for students to complete homework and assignments, to review notes and materials, provide time for sustained reading and to study for quizzes and tests. Each study hall is covered by a certified teacher/staff member.

Homework Club - offered after school, usually 4 days a week (not Fridays). Extra help is ALWAYS available.



Registration:


- **Step 1**: The students will discuss which courses to take with their current teachers & parents (course selection presentation was yesterday).
- Step 2: Fill out the course request sheet and review with your parent(s)/guardian(s).
- **Step 3**: Enter courses with assistance from your HS Counselors next week.
- **Step 4**: Post scheduling any adjustments can be requested to a counselor before the end of March. Schedule adjustments can then take place for the last week of school (June) and again in August through the first 5 days of the semester.
 - You will need to choose 7 (study lab every other day) to 8 credits (no study lab)
 - You must select and prioritize 3 alternate electives.
